This evaluation, which was funded by Pobal Dormant Accounts Funds- Flagship Projects, found that ELI had enhanced the educational outcomes for children and their families, with parents now more involved in their children's education. We hope that the evaluation report will help inform national policy and will be used as a source of information for practitioners and policy makers.

Working together to improve our children's numeracy skills

The NEYAI Docklands Early Numeracy Project has been running for almost two years now. We all look forward to the termly Docklands Early Numeracy Activity Week, when lots of exciting activities take place in our community. Have you ever wondered who comes up with all of the amazing activities for Docklands Early Numeracy Week?

The Docklands Early Numeracy Project Working Group have been working together since June 2011, planning activities and events to promote the teaching and learning of early numeracy in the Docklands. The group is made up of early educators from nine local early years services, together with primary school teachers from infant classes in six Docklands schools and one After School Service.

This group has gone from strength to strength and has successfully highlighted that maths is all around us and is part of so many activities we do every day.

The working group meets four times per year. These meetings are a hive of activity and the buzz of enthusiasm about the Early Numeracy work in the Docklands is inspiring. The group shares a wealth of experience, and a treasure trove of ideas for making learning about early numeracy fun and interesting. An important aspect of their planning is making links with early numeracy in the home, with a focus on sharing ideas about how parents can support their children's learning. One of the key benefits of the working group is that early years settings and primary schools are creating and building upon existing links and networks, providing opportunities for continuity and progression in Early Numeracy learning experiences for children transitioning from ECCE settings to primary school.

The NEYAI Docklands Early Numeracy Project is a real community effort and the Early Learning Initiative is very proud of the success of the team work involved. We hope you enjoy taking part in all of the activities we have prepared for you!

Parent Child Home Programme (PCHP)

The Parent Child Home Programme (PCHP) is a "learning through play experience" for parents and their preschool children in the Docklands. It is designed to strengthen the natural bond between parent and child and to encourage a love of learning. It also helps prepare children for later success in school.

Since September 2011, we have introduced the Child Behavioural Trait (CBT) form as a way of collecting information about the progress of each child in our programme. Each child is unique and they all learn at a different pace. The CBT is a guide to help the parents and Home Visitors to work together to focus on and encourage the child's learning journey.

My Learning Journey

In September 2012 I began a new chapter of my learning journey and started a part-time Degree course in Early Childhood Teaching and Learning at NUI Maynooth.

It has been a long road for me. After my Leaving Certificate I did some initial training in nursery nursing and worked for a number of years in various types of childcare services. After having my own family I was keen to continue working but also to continue my training, and I began a FETAC Level 5 course while working in a community crèche. While it was a balancing act at times, I completed the course and then did my FETAC Level 6 training in Childcare Supervision.

During this time, I was also involved in Continuous Professional Development (CPD) with the ELI, together with my colleagues working in Little Treasures. We are working towards a Síolta Quality Award, which will highlight the hard work and commitment involved in working in an early childhood setting. Through my involvement with the ELI, I also got the opportunity to do a study trip to Scotland with a group of Irish early years professionals. All of the others had a Degree and I decided that I was ready to get my educational journey back on track. I applied to NUI Maynooth and after a long process was accepted on to the course. It is part-time one night a week, one Saturday once a month and a block week in the Autumn for three years. There is no doubt that it is very challenging, but now that I am on the road, I am so excited about where this journey will take me.

Although I realise that having a Degree doesn't make you a good childcare worker, I think good training certainly shows in the staff and I look forward to seeing the impact on the children and families in the centre.

• A good starting point is to get some independent advice. Regina recommended the CDVEC Adult Education Career Guidance Service which is a free one-to-one service and available to people seeking advice on further education.

If you wish to do your own research, the following are some good places to start:

- Local Partnership or Community Development Project
- Local Library
- Schools and Colleges offering full-time and part-time courses
- Education Fairs such as Higher Options or Career Zoo where you can meet all of the providers at the same time.
