New Directions through the Area Based Childhood (ABC) Programme

November 27th was D-Day for the Docklands. Everyone (children, Home Visitors, parents, early years services, schools, after-school services, community organisations, public health nurses and our local TDs) were waiting anxiously to hear if our ABC application was successful.

A sigh of relief and a big cheer went up when the Tánaiste, Eamonn Gilmore and the Minister for Children and Youth Affairs, Frances Fitzgerald, who launched the ABC Programme here in NCI, announced that the Docklands was one of the areas chosen.

Forty-eight organisations, North and South of the Liffey, are committed to working together through the ABC Programme. Our goal is for children and young people in the Docklands to perform to international norms in language, literacy and numeracy with the whole community supporting these children and young people as they progress through the education system and on to employment in the corporate organisations in the Docklands.

Being part of the ABC Programme will enhance the work already being done in the area and allow us to develop it further.

At present, we are developing plans for:

- Continuing the Parent Child Home Programme (PCHP) in Ringsend, East Wall, North Wall and City Quay as well as extending it beyond the North Strand Road to Summerhill, Mountjoy Square and Ballybough
- Providing more supports for parents with small children (0-6 years)
- Sustaining the Docklands Early Numeracy Programme
- Supporting the early years, primary schools and after schools services in implementing Síolta and Aistear, the Irish early years quality and curriculum frameworks
- Extending the ELI's Educational Guidance Programme to other schools, both primary and second level, as well as after-school and community organisations.
- Furthering cooperation between agencies and organisations in the area to ensure a coordinated, effective and person-centred service for children, young people and their families

Once again, a big thank you to all involved in the ABC application. It was a great achievement and an acknowledgement of the great work being done through the ELI network of public health nurses, early years and after school services, schools, community, statutory and corporate organisations. We look forward to working on the ABC Programme with you over the next three years.



Parent Child Home Programme (PCHP)

Our Home Visitors are currently working with preschool children in the homes of eighty families in the Docklands. Parents and Home Visitors are talking, reading and playing with the children while they are getting ready for imminent success in school.

The completion of the two year programme is marked with a graduation ceremony in the NCI for families. Like all big occasions, it is a time of happiness and sadness. There is a huge sense of achievement for families and their Home Visitors for the journey they have made with the children, yet it also means the end of the home visits which have become so much a part of their routine. At our first graduation we had 16 families taking part, this year we hope to have 37 families graduating and with the support of ABC funding, we plan to welcome more families to the programme.

ELI has been conducting interviews with the first cohort of parents and guardians who enrolled in the programme. 15 people were interviewed. Everyone thought the programme had a positive effect on their child's general behaviour. Themes from the research include changing approaches to learning and increasing bonds between child and parent.

NEYAI Docklands Early Numeracy Project 'Symbols in the environment'

The next Docklands Early Numeracy Week will take place from 12th-16th May and it will focus on 'Symbols in the Environment'. Signs and symbols are everywhere and children start to understand what they mean from a very young age, for example children know what the local toy shop is before they can read! Or you might see a baby/ toddler putting a building brick to their ear as if it is a phone. The brick symbolises a phone and they understand what the phone is for. Numbers and letters are symbols too so when children start to recognise signs and symbols this is helping their literacy and numeracy development. Don't forget to join in with the numeracy activities during the Numeracy week in May!

Here are a few activities you could do with your children:

Tips & Hints for Parents

- Point out signs when you are out walking and say what they mean stop sign, bus stop, traffic lights etc.
- Help your child to write a letter to themselves using writing and pictures and bring them to the post office to post it.
- With small babies and toddlers, pretend items are something else e.g. a brick is a phone.
- Simple Charades act out an activity and get the children to guess what it is e.g. mixing the food.



Life Post Primary School

The National College of Ireland welcomed 5th & 6th class students from the Docklands for the Primary Education Guidance Exhibition on Wednesday 26th February. Fifth class students based their projects on particular careers and the qualifications you might need while sixth class developed their own project on a topic relating to second level school.

The aim of the project is to raise educational and career aspirations while encouraging the local community to have a better knowledge of the education system. From choices made at the end of primary school to subject options in second level, students learn how these decisions can impact their future in terms of accessing further education and career opportunities.

We were also pleased to have so many corporate volunteers from our partner organisations acting as judges for the event to provide valuable feedback on the children's presentations. Congratulations to all the students and teachers who took part in the exhibition.

Planning Ahead

It is tough out there for new graduates looking for their first job. Competition is fierce and a first class degree does not necessarily guarantee employment these days. There is a growing emphasis by

employers on the need for graduates to demonstrate a range of competences which will benefit themselves, the company, the community and the economy. Our volunteers from BlackRock, Deloitte and McCann FitzGerald have been mentoring the students and offering their valuable first-hand knowledge of the working world. As part of the ELI Mentoring Programme, we held a workshop to encourage students to think about the key skills employers want and how they could develop these skills. Maria Ging, one of our BlackRock mentors, has provided some very useful "Do's and Don'ts" to help graduates gain future employment and success in their chosen occupations.

Do

- Put thought into your CV/application to ensure you demonstrate the skills the employer seeks
- Research the industry, company, role and interviewer – it shows interest and will help you answer interview questions
- Prepare answers in advance to frequently asked interview questions

Don't

- Be late for interviews
- Undersell yourself e.g. a shop-assistant role shows communication, cash management and customer service skills
- Worry about lack of technical knowledge, enthusiasm and willingness to learn are more important
